


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Vision and Mission

To work with the communities in Malawi by promoting social and economic development through health, education & training, food security, fund raising and environmental programs.




Introduction



At DAPP Malawi, we understand the critical role of teachers in shaping the quality of education and ultimately impacting the development of communities. Fitting the Humana People to People teacher training concept to the Malawi national curriculum, we train dedicated rural primary school teachers. We employ learner-centred pedagogy а our educational initiatives, in focusing on active participation, practical application, and holistic development. Our students go through theoretical and practical training that equips them with "skills, heart, courage, and wisdom" to take up the role of a teacher and community

developer during their deployment.

We also place significant emphasis on technical and vocational skills training as part of our education programs. Our technical and vocational training curricula are aligned to industry standards and requirements as they cover a wide range of skill including areas, carpentry, masonry, plumbing, tailoring, agriculture, and entrepreneurship, to mention a few. Overall, our aim is to equip youth with the necessary skills to become economically selfreliant by owning businesses and being employed.

Teacher Training

We have been providing primary school teacher training since 2003. This initiative signifies our long-term commitment to improving education in Malawi. Over these two decades, we have made significant contributions to the quality of education by equipping teachers with essential skills and knowledge to change their schools and communities. During this time, our teacher training programme has evolved and adapted to meet the changing needs and challenges in the education sector. This involves incorporating new teaching methodologies, integrating technology into education, and addressing specific issues like gender equality, entrepreneurship, and inclusive education. Additionally, the programme has contributed to community development in the various communities our student teachers are allocated to practice and later work. Since then, over 4,000 teachers have graduated, and in 2023, 205 have graduated.

In 2012, we began the implementation of '400 Primary Schools', which is a network of DAPP graduated teachers that support each other to contribute towards the creation of conducive learning environments for learners in their schools. These teachers are the link among the school, learners and the community to spearhead activities that involve teachers, learners, parents and the community in achieving their goal. As of 2023, 175 teachers are implementing this program reaching out to more than 62,000 children in 119 primary schools in 24 districts.


Overall, 20 years of primary school teacher training represents our significant investment in the future of education in the country, with positive implications for both individuals and communities.

Vocational and Technical Skills Training

In the year, we provided various technical and vocational skills to over 350 and 200 young Malawians under formal and informal programmes, respectively. During the course of their training they also gained entrepreneurial skills to enable them create jobs for themselves by starting businesses.

We also provided business and entrepreneurial skills to 73 Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) and Idea-Stage Entrepreneurs that underwent pre-incubation, incubation and post-incubation support. This included business development services and access to finance.



Early Childhood Development

We supported and strengthened Early Childhood Development (ECD) and the transition of children from pre-school education centres to primary schools around DAPP TTCs. We aim to reduce the dropout rate of learners in grade one by ensuring that the primary school learning environment is prepared to accommodate those beginning grade one to proceed further with their studies. We train and certify caregivers, implement school feeding programs and, renovating and establishing playgrounds. In 2023, we worked with 125 community-based ECD centres, trained 476 caregivers and over 1,950 children directly benefitted.

In 2023, we continued working together with people in their communities to address accelerating factors the spread of HIV, Tuberculosis (TB), and Malaria using our comprehensive, systematic epidemic prevention, care, and control model of Total Control of the Epidemics (TCE) which combines house-to-house case detection, rapid field testing, counselling, education, awareness and community mobilisation. Our people-topeople philosophy, centred on the understanding that only the people can liberate

themselves from AIDS, TB. and other epidemics, has been instrumental in the engagement of the population in targeted districts in bringing the epidemics under control. Building on these experiences, we have over the past years scaled up working together with people in their communities to reduce the spread of HIV, tuberculosis (TB), and malaria in various districts in Malawi. We share some of the best practices and key results for 2023.

TB, HIV and AIDS

the Resilient, Through Determined, Empowered, AIDS-Free, Mentored and Safe (DREAMS) Program, we worked with 27,600 Adolescent Girls and Young Women (AGYWs) of 10-24 years, supporting them to access health and other services including HIV testing services (HTS), family planning, education and technical skills support, and genderbased violence prevention amongst others in Blantyre and Chiradzulu districts. Under the Unlocking the Social Capital of Military and Faith Communities to Support HIV/AIDS Services project, more than 2,700 youth of 9-25 years were reached with faith-based HIV and gender-based violence prevention awareness within Kamuzu Barracks and surrounding communities.

In both the TB HIV Epidemic Control Program and TB Local Organization Network 2 project, a total of 3,237 people were tested positive with Tuberculosis (TB) infection and treated in the districts of Zomba, Chiradzulu, Phalombe, Mulanje, Nsanje, Machinga, Mangochi, Chikwawa, Mwanza, Neno, Thyolo and Blantyre. Our combined approach of controlling TB at a health facility and community level, has proved to be effective in the fight against this airborne disease. For the success and sustainability of this effort we engaged 7,325 community based volunteers conducting house-to-house TB education and awareness, tracing and screening for TB patients contacts and collecting and transporting sputum for TB testing. Over 12,900 households and 4,900 contacts were screened for TB.

Overall, we reached out to over 728,000 and 30,000 people with TB and HIV/AIDS interventions respectively.







Malaria

Working in Salima and Lilongwe rural districts, we are reaching out to pregnant women, children under the age of five and the general population with malaria prevention, case detection and case management using behaviour comprehensive change and communication messages in line with the Ministry of Health's malaria communication strategy. We are advocating for behavioural change of community members through sensitisation on early health care seeking Antenatal Care (ANC), behavior, early Intermittent Prevention of Malaria in Pregnancy (IPTp3+) uptake and mosquito nets care

and utilization. We supported mapping and revamping of 18 Community Health Action Groups (CHAGs), provided orientation and conducted Community Action Cycle (CAC) trainings. To enhance sustainability of the project, we provided capacity building for community health structures, we supported Health Care Workers (HCWs) with mentorship and trainings in Malaria case management. Overall, more than 7,400 people accessed malaria care and prevention services in the year.



Agriculture

Strengthening Malawi's farmers through Farmers' Clubs: Cultivating stronger communities, nurturing healthier crops, and safeguarding our environment together.

Agriculture serves as а livelihood for most needy Malawians who currently face the effects of climate change. This being the situation, we approach agriculture as a cornerstone for societal development through the adoption of Humana People to People's Farmers' Clubs model. This concept utilizes farming instructors to organize support smallholder and farmers into local clubs (30-50 farmers) and promotes peer learning as a method transfer and to maintain knowledge on farming and related practices at local level. Through comprehensive training programs, farmers are equipped with the knowledge and skills necessary to

optimize crop yields while preserving natural resources. By promoting climate-smart agriculture and conservation techniques, the skills allow communities to mitigate the effects of climate change and adapt evolving to environmental conditions. The farmers are also trained to set up Village Savings and Loans (VSL) groups so that they diversify their income sources and accumulate assets.

Village Savings and Loans

Village Savings and Loans groups (VSLs) play a crucial role in supporting smallholder farmers, particularly in rural and underserved areas. They present a powerful tool that supports smallholder farmers by providing financial services, fostering community solidarity, and enhancing agricultural productivity and resilience. In 2023, we worked with a total of 62,665 smallholder farmers in the districts Nkhatabay, Nkhotakota, Chikwawa, of Phalombe, Nsanje and Zomba under the Poverty Reduction of Vulnerable Beneficiaries

and Smallscale Enterprise Development (PROVED) project. These farmers belong to 2,307 VSL groups that we are supporting with smallscale enterprise principles. They acquired financial literacy, value chain identification and promotion, and market linkages.

We linked 550 of these groups to formal financial and micro-finance institutions. The project's purpose is for the groups to safely keep their money as well as access loans to boost their businesses and investments.





Disaster Preparedness

We worked with community members in Mnembe and Tizola villages under Traditional Authority Mbenje in Nsanje district. These two villages are regarded as flood-prone. Together we embarked on a disaster risk mitigation plan which involved the construction of storm drains, swalleys, water holding trenches, check dams as well as planting vetiver grass along river banks to help reduce the speed of running water and the protection of the banks.

Our response to Cyclone Freddy

March 2023, southern In Malawi received torrential rains induced by Tropical Cyclone Freddy which led to strong winds, flash floods and severe mudslides. This caused deaths and destruction of homes, buildings and infrastructure. other Over 563,600 people (over 126,215 households) were displaced Nsanje, Chikwawa, in Phalombe, Mulanje, Blantyre, Thyolo, Chiradzulu, Mangochi, Machinga, and Balaka districts who sought shelter in a total of 576 camps. In response to

this, with help from our various partners, we supported more than 14,000 people from Phalombe, Chiradzulu, Thyolo, Mulanje and Nsanje districts. We provided them with clothes, agricultural inputs, school materials for the school-going children and sanitary packages. We also constructed latrines in a camp to promote hygiene and sanitation amongst the people as well as providing education support to two orphanedchildren.


Economic Accessibility | Quality and Variety | Fashion Statements


Finance and Accountability

Good Governance

As DAPP Malawi, we are committed to adhering to the highest standards of accountability, transparency and good governance.

In 2021, we were officially certified for governance policies and procedures, including their implementation, by the internationally renowned inspection and certification company, Société Générale de Surveillance (SGS) NGO Benchmarking Standards based on an external audit.

The SGS NGO Benchmarking Standard is described by SGS as "a reasoned consolidation of some 25 Codes and Standards established by donor agencies, states, funding organisations, associations, philanthropic institutions, etc." This comprises an audit of best practice across our policies and procedures and the organisation's compliance with these standards in 12 defined areas.
